



School Improvement Plan update

Our targets for this session are as follows:-

- Continue to develop skills and embed them into our learning and teaching.
- Enhance staff's knowledge of differentiation.
- Develop our technology curriculum and staff's knowledge and skills to enhance learning and teaching.
- Continue to reduce our Numeracy, Reading and Writing gap.
 Continue to focus on school attendance.
 Continue to work in partnership with Place2Be to provide supports for our targeted families and pupils.

In Woodside, so far this year

- All staff have received input from the Educational Psychologist in supporting neurodiversity within our classes.
- Almost all teaching staff have received input on differentiation.
- All staff have been trained how to use Adobe Express.
- Almost all teaching staff have been trained in 'Read and Write'
- Targeted support groups for literacy and numeracy have been timetabled.

Maths Week Scotland Last week we enjoyed a focus on Maths Week Scotland. The theme this year was Wild Maths which looked at bringing nature and numbers together. Many of our classes took their maths learning outside and have worked on activities that have been using natural resources and linking with different elements of maths. Mrs Barton also set up maths challenge cards around the playground that linked with the Global Goals. She took many of her classes outdoors for some problem solving fun. We have also participated in the Sumdog Maths Week Scotland competition, so we will look forward to seeing how our Woodie Weans have got on. We hope the homework encouraged you to get outdoors and link maths with things you would find outside; from lampposts to leaves.

Young Leaders Of Learning

I was blown away with the number of children who completed the application to be a Young Leader of Learning. It was a really difficult decision to choose 2 participants for each stage. I learned

difficult decision to choose 2 participants for each stage. I learned so many new facts about the children and I was delighted to know that many of them kept their bedrooms tidy!

Well done to Finlay and Robyn in Primary 7, Oliver and Emma in Primary 6, Noah and Alice in Primary 5 and Ryan and Rosie in Primary 4.

This programme was developed by Education Scotland to give children and young people an increased say in their education and their schools. The programme supports the empowered system and also the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (articles 12 and 13). Our group took part in an online training session which focussed on the skills they would need when going to visit other schools. Hopefully we can get out on a visit to both Chatelherault Primary and Auchinraith Primary soon.

Absence rates

We know and understand that ill health and injuries do happen but we always monitor our absences across the school and will get in touch with you by letter if your child's attendance rate drops below 90% or if they are often late for school.

We will be sending our letters out before the October holiday.

The table highlights the importance of being in school.

Absence phone calls should be made to the school before 9.30am.

100% Attendance	0 Days missed	Gives a child and young person the best chance of success and ensures that their full potential is achieved
95% Attendance	Days of Absence week and 4 days learning missed	Is likely to make it harder to achieve full potential and secure the best possible outcomes
90% Attendance	19 days of Absence 3 weeks and 4 days of learning missed	
85% Attendance	27 Days of Absence 5 weeks and 3 days of Learning Missed Almost half a term missed	Is likely to impact significantly on learning and progress which can lead to poorer outcomes in achievement, wellbeing and social
